Call to Order

Chairman Hart called the meeting to order. Executive Director Holmes called the roll. A quorum was present.

Pledge of Allegiance

Chairman Hart led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Introduction of Commissioners/Advisors/Public

Commissioners and Advisors introduced themselves. Ed Coven announced his retirement from DOT effective March 29, 2019. Elizabeth (Liz) Stutts will be replacing Mr. Coven as CTD Advisor effective April 1, 2019.

Department of Transportation Secretary Welcome

Charmain Hart welcomed FDOT Secretary Kevin Thibault. Governor Ron DeSantis named Kevin Thibault as Secretary of the Florida Department of Transportation on January 18, 2019.

Secretary Thibault most recently served as the Southeast Regional Senior Vice President of TranSystems Corporation and has extensive experience in state government having previously served in senior leadership positions with the Florida Department of Transportation for more than 16 years. Secretary Thibault received his Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering from the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth.

Secretary Thibault greeted the Commissioners. He outlined the Governor's top transportation priorities of: (1) looking at safety, (2) relieving congestion, (3) improving quality of life, (4) leverging technology, and (5) providing delivery of transportation solutions for visitors and citizens of Florida. FDOT's focus is on all modes of travel with the core mission of moving people and goods. He noted that this year is FDOT's 50th anniversary. Secretary Thibault thanked the Commissioners for their service and looks forward to a successful partnership between FDOT and CTD in order to achieve the Governor's bold vision for transportation.

Memorials for Becki Forsell and Ray Anderson

Executive Director Holmes and the Commission recognized two great individuals from the Transportation Disadvantaged family who passed-away over the past several months.

Mr. Ray Anderson passed away November 9, 2018. Ray was a valued member of our financial team for several years. He was a member of the National Guard and Tallahassee Moose Lodge #1075. He enjoyed horse racing and was an avid fan of the Washington Redskins and Maryland Terps. He is truly missed by all.

Commissioner "Ms. Becki" Forsell passed away February 25, 2019. Ms. Becki was a tireless advocate for the disabled. She served on many boards, committees, and task forces, as well as the Commission, and was the founder of YES! Of America United, Inc. She enjoyed spending time with her loving husband Craig, her children and grandchildren.

In addition to the Memorials, Executive Director Holmes presented for the Commission's consideration and approval the "Becki Forsell Breaking Barriers Advocacy Award". This award is to honor an individual with a disability for their contributions and advocacy work in a community or region. The individual should be an active and/or past member of a local planning board who has served as a representative of riders with disabilities. The person should be a role model and an advocate for their community with focus on improving the quality of life for the transportation disadvantaged." Chairman Hart asked if there was a motion to approve the award. Vice Chairman Stevens moved and Commissioner Tellez seconded the motion to approve the "Becki Forsell Breaking Barriers Advocacy Award". The motion carried unanimously.

Commissioner/Advisor Reports

Vice Chairman Stevens provided information on the UZURV in Tampa. Vice Chairman Stevens and Executive Director Holmes recently had the opportunity to meet with representatives of UZURV in Tampa. They discussed the programs, initiatives, and timelines. He noted that there are huge unmet needs and some of the things they are doing can meet these needs.

Ed Coven provided an update on the Federal Transit Administration Funding for Federal Fiscal Year 2019. FDOT received the allocations last week. The total in formula funding for the State of Florida for federal transit funding this year is \$404 million, an increase of 1% over last year. Funding for the 5307 program is \$270 million, an increase of 2.4 % over last fiscal year. Funding for the 5311 program is 18.2 million, an increase of 9.1% over last fiscal year. Funding for the 5310 program is \$22.7 million, an increase of 2.8 % over last year. Rural Transportation Assistance funding provides training, including training at the Commission for Transportation Disadvantaged annual conference, is funded at \$291,000, an increase of 9 % over last year. Overall, Transit did well in this year's federal transportation budget.

Executive Director Holmes also noted that this is Julia's last Commission meeting. She has accepted a position with FDOT after serving 2.5 years with the CTD. He thanked her for her service with the Commission.

Public Comments

David Darm thanked the Commission for the opportunity to speak on the partnership that will be presented by UZURV from the APD perspective.

APD is a partner and part of this pilot project, which started last summer. Seeing the initial results from this partnership with UZURV in the Tampa Bay area is very exciting. The purpose is to support individuals who are receiving services through the Medicaid Waiver and are on a Wait List to receive transportation where they may not be able to get through other TD services. Having the necessary transportation services allows them to be more of a part of their community, going to work, shopping, etc. The intent behind the CTD is to address those areas where maybe our respective programs can't address and to fill in those gaps. From the initial work, Mr. Darm noted that have been promising results. He noted that about 50 people have been served through the pilot project. He gave a "shout out" to Executive Director Holmes and the CTD staff in continually keeping communications open with the APD staff. He stated "I am excited about what this will bring and excited about what this might mean in our future partnership, as the Secretary said, our partnership with the Commission and our strategy in identifying what we can do to serve folks with intellectual and developmental disabilities. I wanted to say I consider it an honor to be part of that process and look forward to continuing to work with the CTD in collaborations going forward."

INFORMATION ITEMS

Advantage Ride

Prior to the presentation, Executive Director Steve Holmes provided an Overview of the UZURV/APD program as follows:

During the 2018 Florida Legislative Session, the Legislature tasked the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged to procure an entity that can provide a transportation services experience for persons with intellectual or developmental disabilities (IDD) as defined in section 393.063, Florida Statutes.

The Commission conducted a competitive procurement and awarded UZURV, an Adaptive Transportation Network Company, the contract to provide transportation services to persons with IDD.

On January 27, 2019, UZURV began providing safe, reliable and accessible transportation to eligible persons with IDD in Pinellas, Hillsborough and Manatee Counties to achieve the following objectives:

- Provide cost-effective transportation;
- Improve a person's awareness of and ability to use the transportation system;
- Provide various ways to schedule a ride;
- Provide door-to-door services:
- Provide transportation that crosses county lines;
- Enhance a rider's personal safety before, during and after a trip;
- Ensure a rider is picked-up and dropped-off at the appointed time and place;
- Use drivers who are trained to understand the sensitivity challenges associated with persons with intellectual or developmental disabilities; and
- Establish a transportation network that ensures a person with special mobility needs has access to accessible vehicles.

UZURV is a technology company based in Richmond, VA that operates a Mobility Platform specifically designed to provide safe and reliable transportation options for persons with disabilities, the elderly, and Non-Emergency Medical Transportation.

The people eligible to receive transportation services during the pilot program are:

- Persons with an intellectual or developmental disability as defined in section 393.063, Florida Statutes, who reside in Pinellas, Hillsborough or Manatee Counties; and
- Caregivers who are accompanying a person with an intellectual or development disability as mentioned above.

UZURV will provide:

- On-demand or scheduled transportation services. Transportation can provide trips across county lines when requested by the passenger or passenger's caregiver.
- Door-to-door transportation. The driver can assist the passenger from the doorstep to the car if desired. Also, the driver can assist the passenger from the car to door at the destination.
- Travel training, upon request, to improve a person with an intellectual or developmental disabilities' awareness of, and ability to use, the transportation system.

Transportation is free to eligible riders during the pilot program. Eligible rides for the pilot program are ones to health care, jobs, education, shopping, social activities, or other life-sustaining activities.

The State of Florida desires to expand mobility options for persons with intellectual or developmental disabilities. To that end, the Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged cannot use funds from this program to replace transportation services currently funded by federal, state or local funding sources. For example, transportation to Medicaid Waiver compensable services, such as Adult Day Training or Supported Employment, or an ADA Complementary Paratransit ride would not be eligible rides under this program.

John Donlon, CEO and Travis Snellings, Executive Vice President of UZURV, made a presentation to the Commission on Advantage Ride.

Mr. Donlon stated that the pilot program with the CTD is an important opportunity for us to demonstrate what we feel is a life-changing opportunity which comes through use of technology and new concepts when it comes to transportation. UZURV is a mobility platform and we're taking a concept that most everybody here has had some experience with, ride-share, and adjusting and transforming that so we can provide an entirely new platform for transportation needs in our community. We are taking various individual platforms to merge them together so that a single call, from a single person with different types of needs can be addressed with the right type of transportation to address those needs.

Clay County Community Transportation Coordinator Update

Lisa Darnall, Vice President of Transit Operations with the Jacksonville Transportation Authority provided an update on the services now being offered in Clay County.

As discussed by Executive Director Holmes in the December 20, 2018, Business Meeting, Elder Source pulled their contract with Clay County Council on Aging. The Commission conducted an emergency procurement. Five CTCs responded to the solicitation. The CTD chose Jacksonville Transportation Authority (JTA) as the emergency CTC for Clay County. JTA will remain the CTC until June 30, 2020.

Transportation Response to and Survival of Hurricane Michael

Sharon Peeler from JTrans shared her agency's experience with Hurricane Michael.

JTrans implemented their emergency plan of action. Shelters were opened with approximately 400 from the general population and 63 special needs people that were accommodated by the shelters. They experienced some difficulties due to lack of power and resources but overall could take care of the needs that were presented.

CTD Data Collection System Update

Dan Zeruto, Commission Staff, provided a project update on the Data Collection System (formerly the Annual Operating Report). Special thanks was also given to Kim Hansen for her work on this project.

Training is being scheduled for CTCs over the next two months. Five counties will be testing the Data Collection System and the system should be ready by July 1.

VI. Fiscal Year 2019-20 Shirley Conroy Rural Area Capital Assistance Grant Award Recommendations

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The Department of Transportation authorizes a transfer of \$1.4 million to the Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund in its 5-year work program. The purpose of the allocation is to assist rural areas with the purchase of capital equipment.

The Fiscal Year 2019-20 Grant Application packages were emailed to eligible applicants on April 1, 2019, with a deadline of April 30, 2019. Twenty-three applications were submitted totaling \$1.9 million.

The Shirley Conroy Rural Area Capital Assistance Program Grant Subcommittee met on May 15, 2019. The committee reviewed all capital equipment requests and the award recommendations are attached.

VII. Fiscal Year 2019-2020 Innovation and Service Development Grant Recommendations

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The 2019 Legislature authorized the Commission an additional \$10 million to award competitive grants to Community Transportation Coordinators (CTCs) and transportation network companies (TNCs) for the purposes of providing cost-effective, door-to-door, on-demand and scheduled transportation services that:

- 1. Increase a transportation disadvantaged person's access to and departure from job training, employment, health care, and other life-sustaining services;
- 2. Enhance regional connectivity and cross-county mobility; or,
- 3. Reduce the difficulty in connecting transportation disadvantaged persons to a transportation hub and from the hub to their final destination.

Steve Holmes sent two emails (4-8-19, 4-12-19) advising interested parties about the grant opportunity. Grant application packages were emailed to CTCs on May 3, 2019, with a deadline of May 15, 2019. Twenty-four applications were received requesting \$10.6 million.

The Innovation and Service Development Grant Subcommittee met on May 23, 2019. In attendance were Commissioner Phillip Stevens (via conference call); Agency Advisors Erin Schepers (FDOT), Pete Cohen (DOEA), and Kent Carroll (APD). Commission staff Steve Holmes, Karen Somerset, Cecile Del Moral, Kyle Mills, Dan Zeruto, John Irvine, and Sheri Powers also participated in the meeting. The subcommittee reviewed all proposed project requests and recommend funding seven projects totaling \$1.4 million as reflected in the attached Innovation and Service Development Grant Summary.

The Commission will provide another opportunity for CTCs/TNCs to apply for Innovation and Service Development Grants or modify and resubmit current applications.

Committee Substitute for Senate Bill No. 7068

An act relating to transportation; creating s. 338.2278, F.S.; creating the Multi-use Corridors of Regional Economic Significance Program within the Department of Transportation; providing the purpose of the program; specifying the corridors included in the program; specifying that projects undertaken in the corridors are tolled facilities and certain approved turnpike projects, and are considered as Strategic Intermodal System facilities; requiring the department to identify certain opportunities to accommodate or colocate multiple types of infrastructure-addressing issues during the project development phase; requiring the department to utilize an inclusive, consensus-building mechanism for each proposed multi-use corridor identified during the project development phase; requiring the department to convene a corridor task force composed of certain representatives for each multi-use corridor; requiring the secretary of the department to appoint the members of the respective corridor task forces by a specified date; providing requirements for the corridor tasks forces; requiring the department to adhere to certain recommendations of the task force created for each corridor; authorizing the task force for each corridor to consider and recommend certain innovative concepts; authorizing the department, in consultation with the Department of Environmental Protection, to incorporate certain features into each corridor during the project development phase; requiring each corridor task force to submit a certain report to the Governor and the Legislature by a specified date; requiring the department to provide affected local governments with a copy of the applicable task force report and project alignments; requiring a local government that has an interchange within its jurisdiction to review the applicable task force report and its local comprehensive plan by a specified date; providing requirements for the local government review; providing specified requirements that must be met before project construction in any identified corridor is eligible for funding; providing exceptions to such requirements; authorizing sources of funding for the projects; authorizing the department to accept certain donations of land for the projects; requiring that certain toll revenues from the turnpike system be used to repay advances received from the State Transportation Trust Fund; providing requirements for the department relating to certain delegated responsibilities; requiring the department to perform a specified project evaluation on certain projects; requiring that certain decisions on projects be determined in accordance with applicable department rules, policies, and procedures; providing design requirements for corridor configuration, project alignment, and interchange locations; authorizing the Division of Bond Finance, on behalf of the department, to issue certain bonds to finance projects in the program, as provided in the State Bond Act; providing specified dates for the construction of the projects and opening of the corridors; providing for specified transfers from the State Transportation Trust Fund to the

General Revenue Fund; providing for specified allocations of such transfers; providing requirements for use of funds allocated to the Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund; providing that allocated funds are in addition to any other statutory funding allocations; requiring that specified uncommitted funds be used by the department to fund program projects; authorizing the adopted work program to be amended to transfer funds between appropriations categories or to increase an appropriation category for a certain purpose; authorizing the department to waive consideration of certain matching funds relating to specified programs for hurricane-impacted counties with respect to certain project awards; amending s. 334.044, F.S.; requiring that the department, in consultation with affected stakeholders, provide a road and bridge construction workforce development program for construction of projects designated in the department's work program; providing intent for the workforce development program; providing requirements for the department and the program; authorizing the department to administer certain workforce development contracts with consultants and nonprofit entities; providing primary purposes for such entities; requiring the department to prepare and provide a certain report to the Governor and the Legislature by a specified date; amending s. 320.08, F.S.; deleting a requirement that specified fees from annual license taxes be deposited into the General Revenue Fund; creating s. 339.1373, F.S.; requiring that the department allocate sufficient funds to implement the Multi-use Corridors of Regional Economic Significance Program, develop a plan to expend revenues, and, prior to its adoption, amend the current tentative work program for specified fiscal years to include program projects; requiring the department to submit a certain budget amendment; requiring that specified increases in revenue to the State Transportation Trust Fund be used by the department to fund the Multi-use Corridors of Regional Economic Significance Program; amending s. 339.0801, F.S.; limiting to specified fiscal years a previously authorized transfer of funds to Florida's Turnpike Enterprise; requiring that, beginning with a specified fiscal year, such transfer be allocated for a certain purpose with certain specified preferences; creating s. 337.1101, F.S.; specifying requirements for the department when the department or any entity or enterprise within the department determines that it is in the best interest of the public to resolve a certain protest of the award of a certain contract; providing requirements for a certain memorandum; providing requirements for certain notifications; prohibiting the department from pledging any current or future action by another branch of state government as a condition of any procurement action; requiring certain settlements to be contingent upon and subject to legislative appropriation or statutory amendment; authorizing the department to agree to use its efforts to procure legislative funding or statutory amendments; providing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

Section 1. Section 338.2278, Florida Statutes, is created to read:

CODING: Words stricken are deletions; words underlined are additions.

- 2. At a minimum, for projects constructed under this section, decisions on matters such as corridor configuration, project alignment, and interchange locations must be determined in accordance with applicable department rules, policies, and procedures.
- 3. To the greatest extent practical, corridor configuration, project alignment, and interchange locations shall be designed so that project rights-of-way are not located within conservation lands acquired under the Florida Preservation 2000 Act as established in s. 259.101, and the Florida Forever program as established in s. 259.105.
- (5) In accordance with ss. 337.276, 338.227, and 339.0809, the Division of Bond Finance may issue on behalf of the department right-of-way and bridge construction bonds, turnpike revenue bonds, and Florida Department of Transportation Financing Corporation bonds to finance program projects, as provided in the State Bond Act.
- (6) To the maximum extent feasible, construction of the projects shall begin no later than December 31, 2022, with the corridors open to traffic no later than December 31, 2030.
- (7) Funds that result from increased revenues to the State Transportation Trust Fund derived from the amendments to s. 320.08 made by this act and deposited into the fund pursuant to s. 320.20(5)(a) must be used as follows:
- (a) For the 2019-2020 fiscal year, \$45 million shall be retained in the State Transportation Trust Fund, and the remaining funds shall be transferred to the General Revenue Fund.
- (b) For the 2020-2021 fiscal year, \$90 million shall be retained in the State Transportation Trust Fund, and the remaining funds shall be transferred to the General Revenue Fund.
- (c) For the 2021-2022 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, all of the funds shall be retained in the State Transportation Trust Fund.
- (8) The amounts identified in subsection (7) by fiscal year shall be allocated as follows:
 - (a) For the 2019-2020 fiscal year, to the:
- 1. Multi-use Corridors of Regional Economic Significance Program, \$12.5 million, to be used as specified in this section;
- 2. Small County Road Assistance Program, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 339.2816, with preference to projects in counties impacted by hurricanes;

- 3. Small County Outreach Program, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 339.2818, with preference to projects in counties impacted by hurricanes;
- 4. Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 427.0159; and
- 5. Workforce development program, \$2.5 million, to be used as specified in s. 334.044(35).
 - (b) For the 2020-2021 fiscal year, to the:
- 1. Multi-use Corridors of Regional Economic Significance Program, \$57.5 million, to be used as specified in this section;
- 2. Small County Road Assistance Program, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 339.2816, with preference to projects in counties impacted by hurricanes;
- 3. Small County Outreach Program, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 339.2818, with preference to projects in counties impacted by hurricanes;
- 4. Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 427.0159; and
- 5. Workforce development program, \$2.5 million, to be used as specified in s. 334.044(35).
 - (c) For the 2021-2022 fiscal year, to the:
- 1. Small County Road Assistance Program, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 339.2816, with preference to projects in counties impacted by hurricanes;
- 2. Small County Outreach Program, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 339.2818, with preference to projects in counties impacted by hurricanes;
- 3. Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 427.0159;
- 4. Workforce development program, \$2.5 million, to be used as specified in s. 334.044(35); and
- 5. The remaining funds under this paragraph shall be used for the Multiuse Corridors of Regional Economic Significance Program, as specified in this section.
 - (d) For the 2022-2023 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, to the:

- 1. Small County Road Assistance Program, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 339.2816, with preference to projects in counties impacted by hurricanes;
- 2. Small County Outreach Program, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 339.2818, with preference to projects in counties impacted by hurricanes;
- 3. Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund, \$10 million, to be used as specified in s. 427.0159; and
- 4. The remaining funds under this paragraph shall be used for the Multiuse Corridors of Regional Economic Significance Program, as specified in this section.
- (e) Funds allocated to the Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund in this subsection shall be used to award competitive grants to community transportation coordinators and transportation network companies for the purposes of providing cost-effective, door-to-door, on-demand, and scheduled transportation services that:
- 1. Increase a transportation disadvantaged person's access to and departure from job training, employment, health care, and other lifesustaining services;
 - 2. Enhance regional connectivity and cross-county mobility; or
- 3. Reduce the difficulty in connecting transportation disadvantaged persons to a transportation hub and from the hub to their final destination.
- (f) The funds allocated as provided in this subsection shall be in addition to any other statutory funding allocations provided by law.
- (g) In each fiscal year in which funding provided under this subsection for the Small County Road Assistance Program, the Small County Outreach Program, the Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund, or the workforce development program is not committed by the end of each fiscal year, such uncommitted funds shall be used by the department to fund Multi-use Corridors of Regional Economic Significance Program projects. As provided in s. 339.135(7), the adopted work program may be amended to transfer funds between appropriations categories or to increase an appropriation category to implement this paragraph.
- (9) The department, in its discretion and for hurricane-impacted counties, may waive consideration of local matching funds under s. 339.2816, relating to the Small County Road Assistance Program, and may waive the match requirement of s. 339.2818, relating to the Small County Outreach Program, with respect to project awards funded by the allocations to those programs provided in this section.
