Call to Order

Chairman Stevens called the meeting to order. Executive Director David Darm called the roll. A quorum was present.

Pledge of Allegiance

Chairman Stevens led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Welcome and Introductions

Chairman Stevens invited the Commissioners and Advisors to introduce themselves.

Chairman Stevens informed participants that the meeting was being recorded and all public comments would be reflected in the meeting minutes.

Public Comments

There were no public comments.

Approval of October 25, 2021 Meeting Minutes

Chairman Stevens asked for a motion to approve the minutes from the October 25, 2021 Commission Business Meeting in Daytona Beach:

ACTION TAKEN: Commissioner Knight moved, and Commissioner Gray seconded the motion, to approve the minutes. The motion carried unanimously.

Review and Approval of 2021 Annual Performance Report

The Commission is required to submit an annual performance report to the Governor and Florida Legislature by January 1st of each year. The report includes performance data reported by the Community Transportation Coordinators (CTCs) during the previous state fiscal year (July 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021). Mr. Darm provided an overview of the 2021 Annual Performance Report.

The report includes two sets of performance data: 1) transportation services provided to the Transportation Disadvantaged (TD) population, including services that are "sponsored" by other funding sources (such as Medicaid), as reported by the CTCs within their Annual Operating Reports (AORs); and 2) transportation services that are directly reimbursed under the Trip & Equipment (T&E) Grant program, as reported by the CTCs on their monthly invoice data submitted to the Commission. Mr. Darm stated the 2021 Annual Performance Report would not include all county data tables that were represented in previous year reports to reduce the page count and simplify the content; however, the final version would include a link to the Commission's website that provides county-level tables for readers interested in seeing more detailed trip data.

Mr. Darm discussed the Commission's accomplishments highlighted in the report, including the Commission's adoption of a new funding formula and response efforts to the service level impacts from COVID-19. The report also explains the difference between the AOR and invoice data, with an emphasis on the invoice data in terms of performance evaluation.

Casey Perkins, representing Thomas Howell Ferguson, assisted the Commission in compiling and analyzing the invoice data included within the report. He discussed the service level impacts from COVID-19 during FY20-21, including an analysis of the CTCs that utilized the Commission's rescue funding during this period of time.

Chairman Stevens asked for a motion to approve the report, with the caveat that Commission staff will need to make edits to the "draft version" prior to its publication deadline of January 1, 2022:

ACTION TAKEN: Commissioner Gray moved, and Commissioner Knight seconded the motion, to approve the 2021 Annual Performance Report. The motion carried unanimously.

Approval of 2022 Commission Business Meeting Schedule

The Commission is required to meet at least four times a year and publish its meeting dates and locations for members of the public to attend. The proposed Commission meeting schedule for 2022 was included in the December 15, 2021 Commission Meeting Packet. Mr. Darm presented the tentative dates and locations for each of those meetings: Feb 16, 2022 in Tallahassee (in conjunction with legislative day at the Capitol); May 24, 2022 in Stuart; August 29, 2022 in Orlando (in conjunction with the Commission annual training conference); October 27, 2022 in a location to be determined; and December 2022 for a virtual meeting to approve the 2022 Annual Performance Report.

Chairman Stevens asked for a motion to approve the tentative business meeting schedule for 2022:

ACTION TAKEN: Commissioner Tellez moved, and Commissioner Knight seconded the motion, to approve the 2022 Commission Business Meeting Schedule. The motion carried unanimously.

This concluded the action items for this meeting.

Executive Director Report

Mr. Darm provided an update on legislative priorities and upcoming events for 2022. The Commission has a \$10 million Legislative Budget Request (LBR) to support the following issues: 1) \$4 million in additional budget authority (recurring revenue) to the T&E Grant program; 2) \$6 million in non-recurring revenue to support competitive grants toward innovative transportation service projects, similar to what was originally funded under the Multi-Use Corridors of Regional Economic Significance (M-CORES) program. These requests are now reflected in Governor Ron DeSantis' Budget Recommendations to the Florida Legislature. Mr. Darm discussed the proviso language within the Governor's Recommended Budget concerning the Commission's \$6 million request, which caps funding amounts that the Commission can award for innovative transportation projects. He explained that these caps are intended to ensure CTCs around the state can fairly compete for the funding.

Mr. Darm also discussed other priorities for 2022. The Commission will begin work on redesigning the AOR system to reflect more accurate performance data (beyond what is captured in the T&E Grant invoice data), which will be led by Commissioner Knight. If the Florida Legislature approves the \$6 million for the Innovation & Service Development Grant, the Commission will begin the application process and conduct training workshops in March 2022. Mr. Darm discussed the Commission's new Rider and Stakeholder Relations Subcommittee, which is chaired by Commissioner Gray, to promote greater awareness of the TD Program among individuals and families that benefit from these services. Finally, Mr. Darm discussed a request made by the Florida Public Transportation Association (FPTA) to continue discussions on the use of TD funding in relation to complementary paratransit services required by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

Commissioner and Advisor Reports

There were no reports provided by Commissioners and Advisors.

Public Comments

No additional public comments were made.

Closing Remarks and Adjournment

The next Commission Business Meeting will be on February 16, 2022, in Tallahassee, Florida.

The meeting was adjourned.

Pursuant to Chapter 287, Florida Statutes, Volusia County/Votran, as a governmental entity, is able and willing to continue to provide transportation services. At its August 25, 2021, Board Meeting, the Planning Agency signed a resolution requesting the CTD approve Volusia County/Votran as the designated CTC for Volusia County.

The County of Volusia d/b/a Votran has been the Community Transportation Coordinator (CTC) since 1993.

On April 14, 2021, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization's Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board (TDLCB) approved the annual evaluation for Votran. On October 13, 2021, the TDLCB approved a draft Memorandum of Agreement for Votran's CTC redesignation. Votran was recognized as the Outstanding System of the Year at the 2021 Florida Public Transportation Association/Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged Annual Conference and continues to provide exemplary service.

Therefore, the TDLCB deems it appropriate and in the best interest of the transportation disadvantaged for Votran to continue in its designated role as the CTC until June 30, 2027.

RESOLUTION OF THE RIVER TO SEA TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION RECOMMENDING TO THE FLORIDA COMMISSION FOR THE TRANSPORTATION DISADVANTAGED THAT VOTRAN BE REDESIGNATED AS THE COMMUNITY TRANSPORTATION COORDINATOR FOR VOLUSIA COUNTY

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes 339.175; 23 U.S.C. 134; and 49 U.S.C. 5303 require that the urbanized area, as a condition to the receipt of federal capital or operating assistance, have a continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive transportation planning process that results in plans and programs consistent with the comprehensively planned development of the designated urbanized area; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 U.S.C. 134, 49 U.S.C. 5303, 23 CFR 450.310, and Florida Statutes 339.175, the River to Sea Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process for Volusia County and a portion of Flagler County as defined by the Metropolitan Planning Area; and

WHEREAS, Florida Statutes 427.013 require the TPO, serving as the Designated Official Planning Agency for the Transportation Disadvantaged Program recommend, every five years, a qualified Community Transportation Coordinator (CTC) to the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged (CTD); and

WHEREAS, the CTD Competitive Procurement Manual, compiled in accordance with Chapter 287, F.S., allows the TPO to nominate a governmental entity to serve as the CTC; and

WHEREAS, the CTC is responsible for ensuring that coordinated transportation services are provided to the transportation disadvantaged population in the designated service area of Volusia County. Accordingly, the CTC arranges for the provision of transportation services in a manner that is cost-effective, efficient, and reduces fragmentation and duplication of services; and

WHEREAS, in November 1993, Votran was designated the CTC for Volusia County and currently serves as the CTC; and

WHEREAS, the Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board has approved Votran's FY 2020/21 Evaluation; and

WHEREAS, the Transportation Disadvantaged Local Coordinating Board deems it appropriate and in the best interest of the transportation disadvantaged for Votran to continue in its designated role as the CTC; and

WHEREAS, Volusia County deems it appropriate and in the best interest of public health, safety, and welfare for Votran to continue in its designated role as the CTC.

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the River to Sea TPO that the:

- 1. River to Sea TPO recommends to the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged that the County of Volusia d/b/a Votran be redesignated as the Community Transportation Coordinator for Volusia County; and
- 2. River to Sea TPO submit copies of this resolution to:
 - a. Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged;
 - b. Florida Department of Transportation;
 - c. Federal Transit Administration (through the Florida Department of Transportation);
 - d. Federal Highway Administration (through the Florida Department of Transportation);
 - e. East Central Florida Regional Planning Council; and
 - f. Volusia County.

VII Application of Data to Trip & Equipment Grant Funding Formula for FY 2022-23

BACKGROUND:

The Commission administers the Trip & Equipment (T&E) Grant program in Rule 41-2.014, FAC, which is the primary funding source for Community Transportation Coordinators (CTCs) to deliver transportation disadvantaged (TD) services throughout the state. Each year, the Florida Legislature appropriates funding to the T&E Grant, which authorizes the Commission to then allocate that funding to each county based on a statistical formula in rule.

In 2020, the Commission adopted rule changes to implement a new funding formula, which took effect July 1, 2021 (State Fiscal Year 2021-22). The new formula allocates funding based on the following four variables, which are based on a county's:

- 1. **TD Population (5% of funding)** Based on the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey 5-year estimates.
- 2. **Centerline Miles (5% of funding) of Public Roads** Based on data reported to the Federal Highway Administration.
- 3. Performance in Delivering TD Services under the T&E Grant (30% of funding) Based on the trips, miles and bus passes reimbursed by the Commission, as reported on the monthly invoice data submitted by the county's CTC.
- 4. Percentage of its T&E Grant Allocation from the Previous Fiscal Year, known as the "Base Funding" Variable (60% of funding), to provide stability in funding year-to-year.

For the first year of implementation (FY2021-22), the Commission adjusted the percentages of the variables, with greater weight assigned to the Base (80%), to allow CTCs one year to transition into the new methodology. Beginning July 1, 2022, the new formula will take full effect, with the variable weights reflecting the above percentages.

APPLICATION OF T&E GRANT INVOICE DATA TO FY22-23 ALLOCATIONS

Rule 41-2.014(5)(e), FAC, provides the Commission flexibility in determining which year or relevant period of the data to apply to each of the variables of the formula: "Fund allocations pursuant to paragraph (5)(a) of this rule shall be administered each fiscal year based on available data from the previous year or applicable period as determined by the Commission." This provision is intended to account for extraordinary events (outside of the control of CTCs) that would have an adverse effect on allocations and potentially result in significant reductions in services.

For the first year of the new formula allocations (FY21-22), the Commission applied the FY18-19 invoice data to the performance variable to ensure allocations were not impacted by the service reductions that occurred in response to COVID-19. For FY22-23, the Commission is considering applying the 2019-20 invoice data, which was impacted by COVID-19 during the last four months of that year. The Commission is considering two options being presented at the February 16, 2022 Meeting:

OPTION 1 – Apply the full twelve months of FY19-20 invoice data (July 1, 2019 – June 30, 2020), including the services that were delivered under the T&E Grant during the first four months of COVID-19.

OPTION 2 – Only apply the first eight months of FY19-20 invoice data (July 1, 2019 – February 29, 2020), which were not impacted by COVID-19.

The attached spreadsheet provides initial allocation projections for FY22-23, based on the current appropriation levels being recommended by both the Governor (\$55.1 million to the T&E Grant) and House and Senate (both recommend \$51.1 million, as of February 10, 2022). It provides a side-by-side comparison of the two options being applied under both appropriation scenarios. [It should also be noted that these allocation projections do not include the most recent American Community Survey data for the TD population variable, which is expected to be released by the U.S. Census Bureau in the Spring of 2022].

It is recommended that the Commission only apply the first eight months of FY19-20 invoice data (OPTION 2) to not count the months impacted by COVID-19.

VIII Legislative Update and Executive Director Report

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE (AS OF FEBURARY 10, 2022)

Under the Florida Constitution, the Legislature is required to pass a budget, known as the General Appropriations Act (GAA), for the upcoming state fiscal year by the end of its 60 day session. The 2022 Legislative Session is currently in progress and scheduled to end on March 11, 2022.

Each year prior to the beginning of Legislative Session, the Governor recommends a budget for the Florida Legislature to consider as part of the development of the GAA. For State Fiscal Year 2022-23, Governor Ron DeSantis recommended \$10 million in additional budget authority to the Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund, which includes the following issues:

- \$4 million in additional budget authority (recurring revenue) to the Trip & Equipment (T&E) Grant program, with a total appropriation of \$55.1 million; and
- \$6 million to provide competitive grants to CTCs to develop innovative TD service projects that support increased access to certain activities in the community, greater cross-county mobility, and/or reduce barriers to access public transportation.

The Governor's proposed budget also include proviso that caps the amount of funding that can be awarded to a county or multi-county project under the innovation grant. It also provides that CTCs are the only entities eligible to apply for the innovation grant program; however, it encourages CTCs to utilize Transportation Network Companies (TNCs) and other "non-traditional" providers where available to deliver services under this grant program.

During the first week of February 2022, the House and Senate published their initial budget proposals. Both the House and Senate proposals do <u>not</u> include the \$4 million in additional budget authority, which, if reflected in the final GAA, would fund the T&E Grant program at \$51.1 million. The Senate does include the \$6 million for innovative service projects but provides different funding caps.

The initial allocation projections (based on both the Governor's Recommended Budget and House/Senate proposals) for the T&E Grant are provided within this meeting packet. David Darm will provide an overview of these proposals.
