
#### Be the Difference Battle Flag

Ron was born at Lake Shore Hospital in Lake City, Florida into a family of farmers. He and his wife of 44 years have three children and five grandchildren.

Shortly after attending Lake City Community College, Ronald joined the Department of Transportation in District Two working in the Location Survey

department, moving into roles in Right of Way/ Mapping, Engineer Training, Roadway Design and finally in settling nicely into his leadership role of Drainage Engineer for 32 years. Ron has worked with every State Secretary from Secretary Michael O. O'neal in 1969 to our current Secretary, Kevin Thibault.

Dan Groves has been named the Location Survey Employee of the Year. Clay Driggers explains it best on why Dan was the recipient of this award:

"Every year around the end of the Fiscal Year, we in Location Survey (CC259) vote for an Employee of the Year. This year it was unanimous. We decided Dan Groves was the most deserving for this recognition.

Dan has worked in our Department for 4 years, and was with us for approximately half of this past Fiscal Year. Dan showed strength beyond comparison during the time he was here with us. No matter how bad he was feeling, Dan would come in with a smile on his face. He would crack jokes with all of us when he was able, and he always had great



stories to tell. Dan showed up to work when he did not really feel all that good. Even though he was feeling bad, he did not show it.

Dan fought Cancer for the last five years of his life, and he did not even show the struggles of fighting Cancer until the last year of his life. The last six months of his life, he could not even talk due to the disease. But, this did not prevent Dan from coming to work every day and remaining positive and upbeat. Dan showed up to work until he could not physically do it anymore. Dan lost his fight with Cancer in January, just a few days after his last day of being able to come to work.


Dan will always be an inspiration to our Location Survey Department, and we proudly recognize Dan Groves as our Employee of the Year."


