

SUN Trail Funding Fact Sheet

Timucuan Trail

Visioning for the Timucuan Trail began over 20 years ago. The first trail segment opened along Little Talbot Island in 2005. Local, state, and federal government and nonprofit partners continue using multiple funding sources to implement the vision for connecting culturally rich and ecologically diverse resources along Florida's northeast coast. Most recently the Shared-Use Nonmotorized (SUN) Trail program provided over \$3.1 million for the construction of a half-mile trail extension and bridge crossing Haulover Creek. Located along State Road A1A, also known as Heckscher Drive, this SUN Trail project extends the Timucuan Trail near Ft. George Island Cultural State Park to the city of Jacksonville's Huguenot Memorial Park.

Established during the 2015 legislative session and administered by the Florida Department of Transportation, the SUN Trail program receives \$25 million annually, from new vehicle tag fees, to expand the statewide system of paved multi-use trails (SUN Trail network) for bicyclists and pedestrians. The SUN Trail network aligns to the statewide Florida Greenways and Trails System Plan's Land Trail Priority network. This project improves safety and mobility while enhancing access to Florida's unique resources.
